Weekly Residential Trash & Recycling FAQ

Trash should be in a bin and not bags or unsecured trash. Trash bins should not be put to the curb until after 4:30 pm on Tuesday. Trash bins should be brought back to your unit by 8:00 am Thursday.

What happens on holidays?

If your trash day falls on or after a holiday, your service will be one day later that week. If the holiday falls on a Saturday or Sunday, trash and recycling service is not delayed. Observed holidays are New Year's Day, Memorial Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, Thanksgiving Day, and Christmas Day.

Where should I put my trash and recycling?

Trash and recycling must be placed within 3 feet of the street or curb edge. Trash and recycling should not be obstructed by other items like fences, vehicles, or mailboxes.

What can I do about mattresses, rugs, lumber, or toilets?

Mattresses must be wrapped in plastic for collection at the curb. Rugs must be rolled up and tied with string, and they should not exceed 4 feet long and 50 lbs. Loose lumber is considered construction material and is not collected during weekly curbside service.

Construction waste

Dry wall, glass, plastics, wood and steel, surplus mortar, surplus concrete, broken bricks, green wastes (grass, bushes) and excavated soil are considered construction waste. Construction waste must be taken to the Johnson County landfill. Toilets are collected at the curb, but the tank must be separated from the bowl on all two-piece models. One-piece toilets do not have to be separated.

What can I do about refrigerators, freezers, air conditioners and furniture?

These items are collected for free, but you must contact waste management in advance. To request this service, call (913) 631-3300.

What materials are not taken in regular trash?

Plaster, rubble, & wood from demolition and rehabilitation of buildings are not accepted. Other items not accepted include automotive parts, commercial and industrial waste, hazardous waste like motor oil, polychlorinated biphenyl waste, non-containerized liquid waste, medical waste, and dead animals.

How do I report service issues like missed trash or recycling collection?

Services issues should be reported to the Unified Government by calling 3-1-1 or visiting mywyco.wycokck.org. Do not report services issues to Waste Management. Reporting your issue to the Unified Government allows Public Works' Solid Waste team to track your report and follow up directly with Waste Management.

The regular monthly meeting of the Board of Directors of The Homes, Inc. was called to order at 5:30 p.m. on October 16, 2023

Three stockholders and residents attended the meeting.

It was announced that the work order report for September 2023 has been posted.

Minutes of the regular meeting of September 18, 2023, and the September 18, 2023, executive session had previously been distributed to all board members. Jerry DeMeyer moved to approve the minutes as submitted. Seconded by Elaine Hines. Carried unanimously.

Treasurer Olsen reported that he has reviewed the financial statement for the month of September 2023 and found it to be in good order. Ray Olsen moved to approve the financial report. Seconded by Charles Sawyer. Carried unanimously.

There were no stockholder change requests approved by the manager.

There were no stockholder change requests for board approval.

After being informed that the stock transfers were in order, it was moved by Elaine Hines and seconded by Charles Sawyer that the stockholder change request be approved and that the Corporation waive its option to purchase the shares of stock and approve transfer of same. Old Business to be Discussed:

The corporation is still waiting to hear back from the county appraiser's office on the real estate tax appeal.

Fall furnace inspections are ongoing. So far, no furnaces have had to be replaced.

The clean out of 6 and 8 Summittrest is ongoing. It should be completed by the end of October.

New Business to be Discussed:

3. If trash/items are put to the curb before Tuesday at 4:30, what is the charge?

A new grounds inspector has been hired. Many letters have been sent to correct issues and follow ups are done weekly. If the issue isn't resolved, then The Homes will correct the issue an the resident will be charged.

If a resident finds a stray animal, please do not bring it to the office. It becomes the manager's responsibility to find it a new home or find a rescue group to take it. Animal control will not take in strays because they are at full capacity, and it can take days of reaching out to shelters/rescue groups that are usually too fully to accept the animal.

The K5 Highway bridge repair project should start soon. The bridge has been on the Unified Government's list of repairs since before 2015. The project is expected to cost \$10,000,000.00 and the bridge should be re-opened in 2025.

Political signs in support of the Commissioner Bynum will be placed at the entrances to The Homes. Commissioner Bynum has been a big supporter of The Homes.

Manager discussed recent alarm calls for the office when parties are held in the clubroom. If the alarm to the office is set off during a clubroom rental, the deposit will be forfeited. Signs will be posted with notice of this charge.

The stockholder at 4 Summitteest thanked the board and manager for all their hard work.

Tips to prepare the inside and outside of you home for winter

Inside winter home maintenance tips

- 1. Seal up any cracks or holes. When preparing for winter, one of the best cold weather tips for your home is seal, seal, seal. A great place to start is with your doors. If there are noticeable gaps between the bottom of your door and the door frame, install some weather-stripping door draft stoppers to help keep the cold air out. This may also help with your A/C bill in the summer. Next, check the caulking around your windows. If you see any gaps or areas where the original caulk has worn away, reapply the exterior caulk. You can also purchase transparent, insulating shrink film to apply to the inside of your windows to keep the heat in.
- 2. Protect your pipes. Freezing pipes can be a nightmare. It's important to insulate your pipes, so they don't freeze and burst. Take special care to make sure the pipes along the house's exterior are well-insulated since they're closer to the freezing weather. When you know a cold snap is coming, make sure you put your faucets on a slow drip to keep the water circulating and open any cupboards under the sink to give warm air access to your pipes.
- 3. Make sure your house is well-insulated from top to bottom. Attics can be notorious for lack of proper insulation. Ensure your attic, crawl spaces, floors, and walls have adequate insulation to keep those icy bursts out. If your home has thin, single-paned windows, these may be contributing to heat loss. Consider investing in the double-paned variety that also has an ENERGY STAR certification to help make your energy usage more efficient. If this type of purchase is out of budget, you can invest in some insulated curtains to make sure winter stays outside where it belongs.
- 4. Upgrade to a smart thermostat. Programmable thermostats can make life so much easier. You can set it to automatically adjust to your preferred temperature. For example, you can keep the house cooler while you're away at work and then warm it up 15 minutes before you arrive, so you can walk into a toasty house without paying a fortune. Many smart thermostats can be controlled from your phone and will allow you to set different temperatures in certain parts of the house. According to Energy.gov, never allow your thermostat to drop below 50 degrees in the winter, even if you're out of town, as this could cause your pipes to freeze.
- 5. Prepare your HVAC system and water heater. Your HVAC and your water heater are two of the star players for keeping your home running smoothly and comfortable in the winter. Making sure they're in tip-top shape is a priority. Here are some cold weather tips for preparing your HVAC: Change the air filters. It's best to change your air filters monthly. Cover your A/C condenser to protect against snow and ice. The A/C condenser can be protected by a cover. How to prepare your water heater: Avoid turning up the temperature. Energy.gov recommends setting household water heater temperatures to no lower than 120 degrees and no higher than 140 degrees. Avoid turning your water heater temperature up in the winter because doing so could put you and your family at risk of scalding. Use a water heater insulation blanket if you have an older model. If you have an older model, using a water heater blanket may prevent your water heater from freezing and help your energy bill. Just make sure you get one that is fire resistant and follow the instructions carefully.

Outside winter home maintenance tips

Even with the cold weather conditions, your yard still needs to be maintained. Tool checkup. Make sure your snow shovels are free from cracks. Schedule the annual tune-up for your snow blower, if you have one. Outdoor furniture. Wash upholstery and frames. In northern climates, consider storing both furniture and cushions in a covered spot free from moisture. Clear any landscape debris and waste. Remove any debris or branches from around the HVAC unit, gas meters, basement windows and your dryer exhaust vent. Safely cut back dead or dying limbs and any branches that can touch the roof or siding. When it's windy, branches can rub or scratch the surfaces of your home and cause damage. They could also fall during a storm or break under heavy snow and ice. Sidewalk and driveway. Shovel the snow from the sidewalk and driveway and then follow-up with a de-icing product to prevent slips and falls.



HELPFUL HINTS ABOUT LIVING IN THE HOMES

PLUMBING: DO NOT FLUSH FLUSHABLE WIPES. The pipes in our homes are over 70 years old. They do not have the capacity to wash away any other material. Do not flush baby wipes, feminine hygiene products, diapers, paper towels, Q tips, etc. The sink and tub drains are only for water disposal. Do not force items down the drains. If maintenance finds these items consistently causing a backup in your pipes you may be charged for the repair.

PARKING: The Homes does not have assigned parking. Please be considerate of your neighbors and their parking needs. Try not to park in a spot that is normally used by your neighbor. If you have guest, have them park in the overflow lots. NEVER PARK IN YARDS OR COMMON GROUND.

YARDS & PORCHES: Please take the time to clean up/organize your yard and porch. The size of our porches does not allow for you to keep many items on them before they start to look cluttered and messy. If you do not have a shed an affordable alternative is to store your items in a deck or patio box. They range in cost from \$30 to \$100 and can be purchased on-line or at your local discount store. Items that should not be on your porch: appliances, boxes, buckets, mops, paint containers or any other "non outdoor" items. The office offers free paint for your porch railings.

SPEEDING. The speed limit in The Homes, Inc. is 20 mph. It only takes a few seconds for a distracted child to dart out in the road. Please be aware and safe while driving.

AUTOMOBILE REPAIR. It is against the rules to work on your vehicle in The Homes. If your vehicle needs repair, then you will have to take your vehicle out of the neighborhood or take your vehicle to a mechanic. Unless you are changing a flat tire, you should NEVER put your vehicle on a jack in the Homes.

LITTERING. Think twice about throwing your trash out your car window or into someone's yard. First, it's rude and selfish. Someone will have to pick it up and most of the time it is the maintenance staff. This takes time and money away from other resident's needs. Second, it is against the law. Littering is a Class C violation that is punishable by a fine up to a \$500.00.

KEEP FURNANCE AND WATER HEATER AREAS CLEAN. Having too many clothes, boxes, or general clutter in your utility area can be a fire hazard. Please keep yourself and your neighbors safe and keep your utility areas clean. DO NOT PILE CLOTHES OR OTHER ITEMS ON TOP OF THE WATER HEATER OR FLU AREA.

NOISE. Please be mindful of the level of noise you create. It is our responsibility to keep the sound we make to a reasonable level, so we are not disturbing our neighbors. Sometimes, simply communicating with your neighbors and working out an understanding can resolve this and many other problems.

STICKS AND LIMBS: Place sticks/limbs in 4-foot bundles to the curbside for pickup by maintenance

The multi-day holiday focuses on gatherings of family and friends to ask for the wellbeing of and remember friends and family members who have died, and help support their spiritual journey. Prior to Spanish colonization in the 16th century, the celebration took place at the beginning of summer. Gradually, it was associated with October 31, November 1 and November 2 to coincide with the Western Christian triduum of "Allhallowtide": All Saints' Eve, All Saints' Day, and All Souls' Day. Traditions connected with the holiday include building private altars called "Ofrendas", honoring the deceased using "Calaveras", Aztec marigolds, and the favorite foods and beverages of the departed, and visiting graves with these as gifts. Scholars trace the origins of the modern Mexican holiday to indigenous observances dating back hundreds of years and to an Aztec festival dedicated to the goddess "Mictecacihuatl" The holiday has spread throughout the world, being absorbed within other deep traditions for honoring the dead. It has become a national symbol and as such is taught (for educational purposes) in the nation's schools. In 2008, the tradition was inscribed in the Representative List of the Intangible Cultural Heritage of Humanity by UNESCO.
