MINUTES OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS THE HOMES, INC. July 18, 2016

Vice President John Delameter called the regular monthly meeting of the Board of Directors of The Homes, Inc. to order at 6:00 p.m. on July 18, 2016.

Present were: Charles Sawyer, Effie Barber and John Delameter, Board Members; Elizabeth Bothwell,

Manager; Greg Goheen, Attorney; and Karen Brokesh, Transcriber. Devra Harrison was

absent.

Seven stockholders and residents attended the meeting.

Vice President Delameter welcomed the stockholders and occupants to the meeting. Vice President Delameter also asked all persons in attendance to hold their questions and comments until after the finish of regular business at which time anyone who wishes to speak will be allowed to make a statement.

Vice President Delameter reminded all attendees to state their name and address so that the minutes can accurately reflect all comments made during the open session. Everyone was asked to hold their comments until executive session or to speak with the manager one-on-one if they did not want their comments reflected in open session.

Stockholders are reminded that if they have a problem with their unit, to please report it to the office during regular business hours.

It was announced that the work order report for June, 2016 has been posted.

Elaine Hines joined the meeting.

Richard Mabian and Leticia Zecanigny were present at the invitation of the board to make a presentation on the dangers of diesel emissions from trains. After the conclusion of the presentation, Mr. Mabian and Ms. Zecanigny left the meeting.

Minutes of the regular meeting of June 20, 2016 and the June 20, 2016 Executive Session had previously been distributed to all board members. Charles Sawyer moved to approve the minutes as submitted. Seconded by Effie Barber. Carried unanimously.

The treasurer's report was tabled until the August, 2016 meeting.

After being informed that the stock transfers were in order, it was moved by Effie Barber and seconded by John Delameter that the Corporation waive its option to purchase the shares of stock and approve transfer of same. Carried unanimously. The manager was reminded that all original signed stock certificates must be stored with the credit union if the stockholder has an outstanding loan.

Reports and Announcements:

A small book library has been installed in the neighborhood.

The next Neighborhood Watch meeting will be August 3, 2016 with an ice cream social. Local commissioners and the community police officer have been invited. The annual Night Out Against Crime will be held August 2, 2016 at 6:00 pm.

Effie Barber provided a report from the Bradford-Coffelt Memorial Tree Committee. The trees have been ordered from the Arbor Society. Please contact the office if you are interested in getting a cherry blossom tree for your yard.

The winner of the stockholder trivia drawing is 127 Viewcrest who will receive \$25.00 of next month's maintenance fee.

Stockholders were reminded that the speed limit in The Homes is 20 mph and please look out for small children playing outdoors.

Any tenant who harasses or disturbs the peace of another tenant which, in the opinion of the Board of Directors is detrimental to the welfare of The Homes, Inc., shall be subject to eviction. Complaints of harassment or disturbing the peace must be in writing and the complainant willing to appear at a regular or a special meeting of the Board of Directors.

All dogs must be leashed. It does not matter if your dog is small or is always friendly to everyone. If the dog is outdoors, it must be either on a leash or a tie out. Please be careful leaving dogs tied up outdoors alone, as wild dogs have been known to attack pets in the neighborhood and several small dogs and cats have been killed this way. If stockholders do not comply, they will lose their pet privileges. If you do not remove the pet, the board will pursue eviction.

Old Business to be Discussed:

Oots Lawn Service appreciates the interest in mowing residents' lawns but prefers to do commercial mowing only.

The sale of units is a transaction between the buyer and seller. Due to legal restrictions, the Homes' cannot be involved in the sale of units to a third party.

New Business to be Discussed:

Manager would like to have more uniformity with the trash cans residents use in The Homes through the implementation of a policy that trash cans have attached lids and wheels. New residents would be provided with the trash can when buying their unit and the cost would be included into the closing costs. Over the next several months, manager will work with sections of the neighborhood and existing residents to purchase new trash cans if needed. The board approved adding this policy to the existing policies and procedures.

The Homes is looking into installing a small food pantry box in the neighborhood. It would be stocked with non-perishable donations from residents. Residents in need would have access to the box.

New occupant forms and rules and regulations books will be distributed to all residents at the end of July.

It has been ten years since The Homes started painting units. The units that were painted white need to be painted again, which consist of 2 duplexes, 5 four-plexes and 1 six-plex. Manager recommends that no units be painted white because they show dirt more easily and need to be painted more often. The units painted other colors should last several more years. The cost to repaint the white units will be between \$10,000 and \$15,000. Manager will circulate bids for board consideration.

Comments from Directors and Attorney:

None.

Comments from Stockholders:

Manager reported that she attended a recent police patrol meeting. The Kansas City Kansas Police Department is adopting a new policy where two officers will patrol together in cars. For this reason, if you call in a nonemergency to the police, an officer may not respond.

Bob and Karen Anver, 108 Viewcrest, donated a horse shoe set for use in The Homes.

Sherry McCool, 12 Summitteest, reported several clean out pipes that are sticking too high up out of the ground.

Bob Whittington, 127 Viewcrest, gave some tips to prevent pests from getting into trash cans.

George Tucker, 3125 N. 9th Street, thanked all the staff for all they do.

Dottie Reynolds, 28 Summitcrest, asked about the status of tree removal near her unit.

No further business to come before the board the board adjourned into executive session.

Keep Pets Safe in the Heat

Never leave your pets in a parked car

On an 85-degree day, the temperature inside a car with the windows opened slightly can reach 102 degrees within 10 minutes. After 30 minutes, the temperature will reach 120 degrees.

Watch the humidity

Animals pant to evaporate moisture from their lungs, which takes heat away from their body.

Limit exercise on hot days

On very hot days, limit exercise to early morning or evening hours, and be especially careful with pets with white-colored ears, who are more susceptible to skin cancer, and short-nosed pets, who typically have difficulty breathing.

Don't rely on a fan

Pets respond differently to heat than humans do. (Dogs, for instance, sweat primarily through their feet.) And fans don't cool off pets as effectively as they do people.

Provide ample shade and water

Any time your pet is outside, make sure he or she has protection from heat and sun and plenty of fresh, cold water. In heat waves, add ice to water when possible. Tree shade and tarps are ideal because they don't obstruct air flow. A doghouse does not provide relief from heat—in fact, it makes it worse.

Cool your pet inside and out

Whip up a batch of quick and easy DIY peanut butter popsicles for dogs. (You can use peanut butter or another favorite food.)

1 cup peanut butter, preferably unsalted and unsweetened Half a ripe banana, mashed Water as needed

In a small mixing bowl, combine peanut butter with a little water or half a mashed banana. The water and banana aren't essential, but they help with freezing consistency.

Spoon the mixture into the cubes lined with wax paper, or drop onto a cookie sheet. Freeze for several hours or overnight.

And always provide water, whether your pets are inside or out.

SPECIFICATIONS FOR PET OWNERSHIP IN THE HOMES, INC.

- All dogs must be registered by providing a photograph of the animal with the office within thirty (30) days.
- Permission to keep pets such as dogs, cats or other legal pets will be withdrawn by the Board of Directors upon receipt of valid complaints about the pets.
- Pets are to be penned, on a tie-out or leash at all times they
 are outdoors. Pets should not be tied near street-side
 sidewalks. These sidewalks are for public pedestrian use
 and are not to be obstructed.
- Residents are allowed no more than two (2) dogs or five (5) cats per unit. Any combination of up to five (5) pets is allowed as long as there are no more than two (2) dogs.
- No excessive barking between the hours of 11pm and 8am is allowed.
- Pets who are required to do so by city ordinance should be licensed and vaccinated for rabies yearly.
- Defecation must be removed from the yard on a regular basis. If the stockholder is unable to do this work for any reason, there are services listed under pets in the yellow pages that will do this work for a nominal fee. If The Homes has to remove excessive pet waste from a stockholder's yard, there will be a \$50.00 charge for each occurrence.

Flagrant violations of these specifications can result in eviction under the nuisance clause of The Homes, Inc. Rules and

HELPFUL HINTS ABOUT LIVING IN THE HOMES

SPEEDING. The speed limit in The Homes, Inc. is 20 mph. It only takes a few seconds for a distracted child to dart out in the road. Please be aware and safe while driving.

PARKING: The Homes does not have assigned parking. Please be considerate of your neighbors and their parking needs. Try not to park in a spot that is normally used by your neighbor. If you have guest, have them park in the overflow lots. **NEVER PARK IN YARDS OR COMMON GROUND.**

TOYS & BIKES: Please do not leave toys & bikes in the parks. They create a mowing hazard and a opportunity for thieves. If you have lost a toy or bike in a park, check the office to see if it was picked up.

LITTERING. Think twice about throwing your trash out your car window or into someone's yard. First, it's rude and selfish. Someone will have to pick it up and most of the time it is the maintenance staff. This takes time and money away from other residents needs. Second, it is against the law. Littering is a Class C violation that is punishable by a fine up to a \$500.00. If you are witnessed littering the police will be called and you will be charged, by The Homes, for the time it takes to pick it up and dispose of it.

BURN PILE AND DUMPSTER. Contact the office before dumping items in the burn pile located at the office. DO NOT PLACE BUILDING MATERIALS IN THE BURN PILE. DO NOT OVERFILL THE DUMPSTER LOCATED IN THE OFFICE PARKING LOT.

STICKS AND LIMBS: Place sticks/limbs in 4 foot bundles to the curbside for pickup by maintenance.

TRASH. Do no put your trash to the curb until 4:00 p.m. the day before pickup.

AUTOMOBILE REPAIR. It is against the rules to work on your vehicle in The Homes. If your vehicle needs repair then you will have to go out of the neighborhood or take your vehicle to a mechanic. Unless you are changing a flat tire you should never put your vehicle on a jack in the Homes.

PLUMBING: DO NOT FLUSH FLUSHABLE WIPES. The pipes in our homes are over 70 years old. They do not have the capacity to wash away any other material. Do not flush baby wipes, feminine hygiene products, diapers, paper towels, Q tips, etc. The sink and tub drains are only for water disposal. Do not force items down the drains. If maintenance finds these items consistently causing a back up in your pipes you may be charged for the repair.
