# Meeting at the clubroom on Tuesday, December 1, 6:30pm JOIN NEIGHBORHOOD WATCH

You and your neighbors can prevent crime, and in the process, build your community into a safer, friendlier and more caring place to live. Statistics tell the story. Police and sheriffs' departments in cities, small towns, and suburbs throughout the country report substantial decreases in crime and fear because of local crime prevention efforts.

<u>Light It</u> - Sounds simple right? You be amazed about how easy it is to light up the outside of our home at night however many owners are in the dark. Keep your front and rear outside lights on 8pm to 4am at least. You can easily add timer switches to these lights (\$20/each) to automate this.

<u>Lock It</u> - don't leave your house with your windows open. You are making it easy to break into your home. Make sure your locks and strike plates are well-secured and working properly and for the sliding glass doors add a pin lock or a short stick or bar between the jam and door so it can't be easily slid open.

<u>Lower The Temptation—If</u> you leave you home make sure to not leave your drapes or blinds open. Someone could look into your windows and see what you have. If you leave them open you are just making it easy for the burglar to decide if he wants to rob your home or not. If you leave them closed he doesn't know what you have and will look elsewhere. Also if you have large shrubs or bushes in front of windows consider removing them or trimming them back. You do not want to "make" a hiding place for someone to work on breaking in or to hide a broken window.

<u>Record and Document</u> - If you do get burglarized how can you insure yourself? First take pictures of all of your belongings BEFORE something happens and document the cost of each item. I know it sounds hard and tedious to do but it will save you time and headaches when filing an insurance claim.

<u>Going on Vacation?</u> Let a neighbor know you will be gone and to look out for your place. Add timers to interior lamps that will randomly turn on lights or a radio at various intervals; in doing so it may look or feel like someone is home.

<u>Watch your Children</u> — If you children are outside teach them about safety. There are many classes that your children can attend on general safety issues.

<u>Look Out—If</u> you see something suspicious, like a stranger walking around oddly or a parked car with someone in it for a long period of time or a nondescript van taking out furniture or belongings. Call the Police if you feel something is wrong. Remember utility companies almost NEVER visit a house to do any kind of inspection. Don't let anyone in your house unless you have called or are expecting them.

#### **8 THINGS A BURGLAR WON'T TELL YOU:**

- 1. Sometimes, I carry a clipboard. Sometimes, I dress like a lawn guy and carry a rake. I do my best to never, ever look like a crook.

#### MINUTES OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS THE HOMES, INC. November 16, 2015

President Kayla Ross called the regular monthly meeting of the Board of Directors of The Homes, Inc. to order at 6:30 p.m. on November 16, 2015.

Present were: Kayla Ross, Elaine Hines, Charles Sawyer, Frank Moss and Effie Barber, Board Members; Elizabeth Bothwell, Manager; Greg Goheen, Attorney; and Karen Brokesh, Transcriber.

Fourteen stockholders and residents attended the meeting.

President Ross welcomed the stockholders and occupants to the meeting. President Ross also asked all persons in attendance to hold their questions and comments until after the finish of regular business at which time anyone who wishes to speak will be allowed to make a statement.

President Ross reminded all attendees to state their name and address so that the minutes can accurately reflect all comments made during the open session. Everyone was asked to hold their comments until executive session or to speak with the manager one-on-one if they did not want their comments reflected in open session.

Stockholders are reminded that if they have a problem with their unit, to please report it to the office during regular business hours.

It was announced that the work order report for October, 2015 has been posted.

Minutes of the regular meeting of October 19, 2015 and the October 19, 2015 Executive Session had previously been distributed to all board members. Elaine Hines moved to approve the minutes as submitted. Seconded by Effie Barber. Carried unanimously.

Treasurer Moss reported that the financial statement for October has been reviewed and found to be in good order. Frank Moss moved to accept the financial report as presented. Seconded by Elaine Hines. Carried unanimously.

Stockholder change request approved by the manager are as follows:

3148 N. Allis: Install cable television – Kayla Ross. Work will be done by Time Warner Cable.

965 Manorcrest: Install Google internet – Cesar Martinez. Work to be done by Google

The stockholder change request for board consideration was that of John Delameter, 16 Summitcrest, to replace the kitchen windows and shorten them to approximately 64 x 39 and add an outlet near the window. Any siding that is required will be installed properly. Work will be done by self and Delameter Plumbing and Remodeling. Frank Moss moved to approve the change request. Seconded by Elaine Hines. Carried unanimously. The Homes will pay for half of the expense of the window replacement.

After being informed that the stock transfers were in order, it was moved by Elaine Hines and seconded by Effie Barber that the Corporation waive its option to purchase the shares of stock and approve transfer of same. Carried unanimously. The manager was reminded that all original signed stock certificates must be stored with the credit union if the stockholder has an outstanding loan.

#### Reports and Announcements:

The Neighborhood Watch Committee plans to install the new swing set this week where the old swing set used to be. The Committee has received a \$500.00 grant from Liveable Neighborhoods which will be used to pay a portion of the cost of purchasing a Rosetta Stone program to assist maintenance workers learn Spanish.

The Finance Committee did not meet this month.

The Lawn of the Month Committee will be awarding cash prizes for holiday lighting in December. There will be ten \$20.00 winners and ten \$10.00 winners. The decorations must be up by December 20, 2015.

There was no report from the Bradford-Coffelt Memorial Tree Committee this month. The committee is still in need of new members and persons interested should contact the office.

The winner of the stockholder trivia drawing for October is 25 Viewcrest. The winner for this month is 127 Viewcrest. Both winners will receive \$25.00 of next month's maintenance fee.

Stockholders were reminded that the speed limit in The Homes is 20 mph and please look out for small children playing outdoors.

Tenants are prohibited from storing highly combustible materials including, but not limited to, gasoline, kerosene and propane, in their units. The accumulation or storage of paper, newspapers, magazines, paper and wooden boxes in a unit in such quantities that pose a fire hazard is also prohibited.

All dogs must be leashed. It does not matter if your dog is small or is always friendly to everyone. If the dog is outdoors, it must be either on a leash or a tie out. Please be careful leaving dogs tied up outdoors alone, as wild dogs have been known to attack pets in the neighborhood and several small dogs and cats have been killed this way. If stockholders do not comply, they will lose their pet privileges. If you do not remove the pet, the board will pursue eviction.

#### Old Business to be Discussed:

Manager continues to work with the director of water distribution at the BPU and the Unified Government Engineering Department on the replacement of sewer and fresh water lines.

Weather permitting, the Blue Spruce tree purchased with the Bradford Coffelt Memorial Tree Fund will be planted near the office within the next two weeks.

Manager reported that code allows existing bars on windows of the units are permitted but that installing new bars on windows is not. Manager was asked to check on the date of installation of bars on windows at a unit on Viewcrest.

The board continued discussions on implementing a policy requiring annual inspections of all air conditioning units. An 18-point checklist will be used and the charge will be \$45.00 per unit which would be billed to each unit. If it is discovered that the unit is faulty and will cause damage to the furnace, the air conditioner will be disabled until the resident has the air conditioning unit repaired or replaced at their expense. Maintenance will inspect the unit after the repair to confirm the proper repairs have been made

before the unit is allowed to be operated. Consideration will be made about units that do not have central air conditioning units. The matter was tabled for further discussion at the December meeting.

The board continued discussions about paying a portion of the costs incurred by stockholders who are putting new insulation in their units. The average cost of materials to insulate an attic is \$1,300; for walls is \$400; and for a crawl space is \$500. This does not include labor or equipment. The process for paying costs and labor was discussed. If this is allowed, the bids will need to be submitted to the board for approval prior to the work is done.

New Business to be Discussed:

Recently, kids have been seen in the neighborhood with BB guns. Car windows have been shot out. Please notify the policy if you see any child in the community with a BB gun.

Comments from Directors and Attorney:

Effie Barber reported that people have been gaining access to units lately and asked that everyone look out for their neighbors.

Comments from Stockholders:

Dottie Reynolds, 38 Summitcrest, commented on the insurance aspect of units with bars on windows. Sherry McCool, 12 Summitcrest, thanked the staff for removing all of the debris after the recent storms.

John Delameter, 16 Summitcrest, reported on his progress in obtaining signatures on the petition for repairs to the streets.

Bob Whittington, 127 Viewcrest, thanked maintenance for their help after the recent power outage.

No further business to come before the board the board adjourned into executive session.

#### HELPFUL HINTS ABOUT LIVING IN THE HOMES

**NEED CURRENT CONTACT NUMBERS.** It is crucial that the office can reach every resident. We might have a question about a work order or need to alert you to damage to your unit because of a fire. Please call the office and give us your current telephone number.

**NOISE.** Please be mindful of the level of noise you create. It is our responsibility to keep the sound we make to a reasonable level so we are not disturbing our neighbors. Sometimes, simply communicating with your neighbors and working out an understanding can resolve this and many other problems.

**BURN PILE AND DUMPSTER.** Contact the office before dumping items in the burn pile located at the office. <u>DO NOT PLACE BUILDING MATERIALS IN THE BURN PILE.</u> <u>DO NOT OVERFILL THE DUMPSTER LOCATED IN THE OFFICE PARKING LOT.</u>

**STICKS AND LIMBS:** Place sticks/limbs in 4 foot bundles to the curbside for pickup by maintenance.

**TOYS & BIKES:** Please do not leave toys & bikes in the parks. They create a mowing hazard and a opportunity for thieves. If you have lost a toy or bike in a park, check the office to see if it was picked up.

**TRASH**. Do no put your trash to the curb until 4:00 p.m. the day before pickup.

**AUTOMOBILE REPAIR**. It is against the rules to work on your vehicle in The Homes. If your vehicle needs repair then you will have to go out of the neighborhood or take your vehicle to a mechanic. Unless you are changing a flat tire you should never put your vehicle on a jack in the Homes.

**PARKING:** The Homes does not have assigned parking. Please be considerate of your neighbors and their parking needs. Try not to park in a spot that is normally used by your neighbor. If you have guest, have them park in the overflow lots. **NEVER PARK IN YARDS OR COMMON GROUND.** 

**PLUMBING: DO NOT FLUSH FLUSHABLE WIPES**. The pipes in our homes are over 70 years old. They do not have the capacity to wash away any other material. **Do not flush baby wipes, feminine hygiene products, diapers, paper towels, Q tips, etc. The sink and tub drains are only for water disposal. <b>Do not force items down the drains.** If maintenance finds these items consistently causing a back up in your pipes you may be charged for the repair.

**KEEP FURNANCE AND WATER HEATER AREAS CLEAN.** Having too many clothes, boxes, or general clutter in your utility area can be a fire hazard. Please keep yourself and your neighbors safe and keep your utility areas clean. **DO NOT PILE CLOTHES OR OTHER ITEMS ON TOP OF THE WATER HEATER OR FLU AREA.** 

**YARDS & PORCHES:** Please take the time to clean up/organize your yard and porch. The size of our porches do not allow for you to keep many items on them before they start to look cluttered and messy. If you do not have a shed an affordable idea to store your items in are: deck and patio boxes. They range in cost from \$30 to \$100 and can be purchased on-line or at your local discount store. Items that should not be on your porch: **appliances, boxes, buckets, mops, paint containers or any other "non outdoor" items**. The office offers free paint for the porches.

## Tips for shoveling snow

Winter is here and that means the possibility of snow. For efficiency and safety follow these tips to shoveling snow.

- 1. Stretch first. Don't be in a hurry to get outside. Stretch thoroughly using the same sorts of moves that runners, mountain bikers and other athletes use. Stretch your hamstrings, stretch your back, and stretch your shoulders. Then dress in removable layers, grab your shovel and resist the urge to fly at the white stuff just to get the job done. Pace yourself. Start slowly and ramp up to speed.
- 2. Don't move snow twice. Before you even take your first scoop, decide where you're going to dump the snow. Drop the first shovelful farther away from where you are standing, then dump remaining snow closer and closer to where you are. That way, the last scoops that you shovel are moved the shortest distance. Don't block access to snow that needs to be removed by piling it up in a way that will force you to move it twice.
- 3. Move snow the shortest distance possible. Consider that everything from a driveway to a patio to a walkway is really a rectangle, and rectangles have a center point. Move the snow from the center of the rectangle to the nearest edge.
- 4. Clear cars first. Brush snow off cars then clear around the cars.
- 5. Do the foreground then the background. For example, to clear snow from a rectangle, first shovel a strip clear along the perimeter of the rectangle. Then, moving from the center to the edge, push the snow into the cleared area. Next, lift and throw the snow out of the area.
- 6. Maintain proper posture:
- A. Use your leg muscles as much as possible push snow when you can and use your legs to lift when you can't push it.
- B. Keep your back straight as you move from the squat position to the upright position.
- C. Use your shoulder muscles as much as possible.
- D. Hold the snow shovel as close to your upper body as possible.
- E. Keep one hand close to the shovel blade for better leverage.
- F. Don't twist your upper body as you throw snow.
- 7. Keep hydrated. Take bottles of water out with you and keep them accessible, either in the car or on the front stoop or somewhere else convenient.
- 8. Rest frequently. Clearing an area by hand means that you may lift and carry anywhere from hundreds of pounds to tons of snow.
- 9. Be thorough but not fussy. The sun is relatively strong this time of year. Clear an area, spread de-icer if necessary and then let the sun do the rest. The fact is, any surface color that you expose in shoveling (gray, green, brown or black) will be far less reflective than a thick blanket of snow, and remaining snow will melt more easily from that darker surface.
- 10. Don't overdress. You need to stay warm, but if you overdress you're going to be soaked in sweat in no time. Dress in loose-fitting layers that you can peel off as you heat up.
- 11. Whenever possible, team up. Shoveling with a friend or neighbor is inherently more enjoyable than shoveling on your own. Plus, it's quicker to get the job done with two or three sets of hands.
- 5. Name one thing that you should not flush?

- 12. Go easy on the de-icer. Once the area is clear, all you need is a thin scattering of de-icer to keep it that way. If you're scattering by hand, throw the salt, pellets or granules low along the ground so they bounce and roll into a uniform layer.
- 13. Whenever possible, get a head start. It's easier to remove snow in thin layers than wait until all the snow is down to have at it. If it looks like your area is going to get dumped on, try to get out there and shovel it in several passes.
- 14. Maintain your equipment. The front edge of a snow shovel takes a beating. If it's metal, hammer it straight when it gets bent; if it's plastic use a utility knife to carve off the burr that forms on its end. Tighten a loose handle by driving a large hex head sheet metal screw through the blade socket and into the handle.
- 15. Stretch when you're done. Stretch gently when you're done and use an ice pack and ibuprofen to take care of inflamed muscles. Rest and remain hydrated.

# The Kansas Department of Transportation is reminding motorists how to be prepared for winter driving with a series of common sense tips.

- Find out about driving conditions before you go.
- Slow down for wet, snowy, icy conditions.
- Avoid quick braking or acceleration.
- Buckle up every time.
- Turn signals, brake lights and windows need to be clear of snow. You should never use cruise control in winter weather conditions.
- Avoid excessive actions while steering, braking or accelerating to lessen the chances of losing control of the vehicle.
- When accelerating on snow or ice, take it slow to avoid slipping and sliding. If you have anti-lock brakes, press the pedal down firmly and hold it. If you don't have anti-lock brakes, gently pump the pedal.
- If your car loses traction and begins to slide, steer in the direction you want to go. Anticipate a second skid in the opposite direction as the car straightens out.
- Slow down when approaching intersections, off-ramps, bridges or shady spots. These are all candidates for developing black ice a thin coating of clear ice that can form on the pavement surface that may be difficult to see.
- Drivers should allow additional room between their vehicles and others. Winter road conditions often result in longer stopping distances. Leave extra room between you and the vehicle in front of you.

As part of this service, Harvesters collects food and groceries from private donations, the government, and local businesses, and the food banks and pantries listed below will distribute the aid to Kansas City residents who need help.

Below you will find information on where to go and who to call for free help. There are many different options and resources available in Kansas City, including churches, the local Salvation Army, community action agencies, and other local not for profit organizations and charities. They may have everything from free holiday meals to lunches from a soup kitchen or a Meals on Wheels service for senior citizens.

Most of the organizations listed will be able to provide some type of support, regardless of the applicants income or background. Even if they can't provide you with direct financial assistance or food, they will be able to redirect you towards other government and/or low income programs and services.
