The Homes is using Titan protection and consulting. A patrol officer will patrol the Homes in a vehicle and on foot during late evening and early morning. The following is a letter from Titan to each resident.

Titan Protection and Consulting is the new courtesy patrol at your service. With a fully trained and professional staff, we plan to respond to any of your community concerns. From noise complaints to emergencies in progress, we will be here. Residents may call the live dispatch center anonymously for a concern, or give their full information for a call back. In addition to the Titan officers providing public safety, we also provide you with a complimentary roadside assist package. This package includes vehicle lockouts, tire changing, and jumpstarts for anyone on the property. In addition to the roadside assist, a complimentary house watch program is available. If you are out of town, officers come by nightly to make sure all of your doors and windows are secure. Feel free to call the dispatch center or flag down an officer to receive these services. You will see the officers walking and driving through the property at random times through the night, so feel free to introduce yourself and ask them any questions that you might have.

MINUTES OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS THE HOMES, INC. August 15, 2016

President Elaine Hines called the regular monthly meeting of the Board of Directors of The Homes, Inc. to order at 6:00 p.m. on August 15, 2016.

Present were: Elaine Hines, Charles Sawyer, Effie Barber, Devra Harrison and John Delameter, Board Members; Elizabeth Bothwell, Manager; Rob Turner, Attorney; and Karen Brokesh,

Transcriber.

Seven stockholders and residents attended the meeting.

President Hines welcomed the stockholders and occupants to the meeting. President Hines also asked all persons in attendance to hold their questions and comments until after the finish of regular business at which time anyone who wishes to speak will be allowed to make a statement.

President Hines reminded all attendees to state their name and address so that the minutes can accurately reflect all comments made during the open session. Everyone was asked to hold their comments until executive session or to speak with the manager one-on-one if they did not want their comments reflected in open session.

Stockholders are reminded that if they have a problem with their unit, to please report it to the office during regular business hours.

It was announced that the work order report for July, 2016 has been posted.

Minutes of the regular meeting of July 18, 2016 and the July 18, 2016 Executive Session had previously been distributed to all board members. Effie Barber moved to approve the minutes as submitted. Seconded by Charles Sawyer. Carried unanimously.

Treasurer Harrison reported that the financial statements for June and July have been reviewed and found to be in good order. Devra Harrison moved to accept the financial reports as presented. Seconded by John Delameter. Carried unanimously.

There were no stockholder change requests approved by the manager this month.

The stockholder change request for board approval was that of Kenneth Pier, 20 Summitcrest, to install a 10 x 12 shed. There is room in the yard to accommodate the shed. Effie Barber moved to approve the stockholder change request. Seconded by Charles Sawyer. Carried unanimously.

After being informed that the stock transfers were in order, it was moved by Effie Barber and seconded by Charles Sawyer that the Corporation waive its option to purchase the shares of stock and approve transfer of same. Carried unanimously. The manager was reminded that all original signed stock certificates must be

stored with the credit union if the stockholder has an outstanding loan.

Reports and Announcements:

A shelter has been located for sale for the soccer field. Cement footings will be needed to install the shelter. There will be a spaghetti dinner in the clubroom on the first Tuesday in October which is free for everyone to attend. The deadline for the next Liveable Neighborhood grant is the end of September. Suggestions are welcome for use of the funds if the grant is awarded.

Effie Barber provided a report from the Bradford-Coffelt Memorial Tree Committee. She is awaiting the tree shipment from the Arbor Society. Please contact the office if you are interested in getting a cherry blossom tree for your yard.

The winner of the stockholder trivia drawing is 866 Manorcrest who will receive \$25.00 of next month's maintenance fee.

Manager informed the board of the deaths of two stockholders recently, Robert Morris and Pamela Dunn. Mr. Morris was one of the original stockholders in the community.

Stockholders were reminded that the speed limit in The Homes is 20 mph and please look out for small children playing outdoors.

The Homes, Inc. and the residents shall cooperate in the care of the buildings and the grounds. It is the responsibility of the resident to notify The Homes of damage or needed repairs.

All dogs must be leashed. It does not matter if your dog is small or is always friendly to everyone. If the dog is outdoors, it must be either on a leash or a tie out. Please be careful leaving dogs tied up outdoors alone, as wild dogs have been known to attack pets in the neighborhood and several small dogs and cats have been killed this way. If stockholders do not comply, they will lose their pet privileges. If you do not remove the pet, the board will pursue eviction.

Old Business to be Discussed:

The Unified Government has denied the installation of a small food pantry box in the neighborhood because it involves food and there are restrictions on how food is stored and distributed. Manager will check with the Unified Government to see if the food pantry would be allowed to be located in the office.

The cost to paint the outside of 2 duplexes, 3 four-plexes and 1 six-plex is \$16,500.00. Manager discussed possible new paint colors and will contact the residents of the buildings to see what color they would like.

New Business to be Discussed:

Fall inspections will begin September 6, 2016.

The board discussed implementing a policy on for sale signs in yards. Uniform pre-approved signs could be used by stockholders who have their units for sale. Charles Sawyer moved to amend the current sign policy to allow the use of approved for sale signs issued by The Homes for a \$5 rental fee a month. Seconded by Effie Barber. Carried unanimously.

A discussion was held about replacing attic stairs in units. Some stockholders have asked if maintenance install them if the stockholder buys them. Stockholders will need to hire a contractor to install any replacement stairs. Manager has a list of contractors that can do this work and they will be published in the

newsletter.

Comments from Stockholders:
Sherry Davis, 56 Viewcrest, asked about stock dividend checks that used to be issued by the corporation and commented on the attic stairs in most units.
Bob Whittington, 127 Viewcrest, reported on a stray dog seen in the neighborhood and noise complaints.
Bob Anver, 108 Viewcrest, commented on the loss of communication within the neighborhood and had suggestions on renewing circulation of the newsletter.
Sherry McCool, 12 Summitcrest, thanked the Neighborhood Watch Committee for all their work and help in the community.
No further business to come before the board the board adjourned into executive session.

September Lawn & Garden To-Do List

Now's the time to be outside to enjoy the beautiful weather while taking care of some of the following lawn and garden tasks for September.

Annuals and Perennials

Divide and/or transplant perennials, making sure to feed the roots with a good source of phosphorus.

Don't disturb asters, chrysanthemums, Russian sage, ornamental grasses, or other plants that are of interest in the fall and winter.

September is the month to plant or transplant peonies.

Plant annuals such as ornamental cabbage, pansies, violas, and snapdragons.

After first frost in zones 7 and below, dig up and store tender bulbs such as caladium, canna, taro, elephant ear, dahlia, and tuberous begonia.

Shrubs and Trees

Container grown trees and shrubs can be planted now.

Remove any dead shrubs and trees.

Transplant trees and shrubs after the leaves begin to turn.

Clean up fallen fruit to deter pests and disease.

Address diseases now. Remove and destroy (do not compost) unhealthy leaves and branches after treating.

Remove spent blooms, but don't do any heavy pruning that would encourage new growth

Hold off on fertilizing trees and shrubs to allow them to harden before winter.

Vegetable Garden

Plant late-season vegetables such as peas, broccoli, cauliflower, cabbages, kale, brussel sprouts, leeks, lettuce, radishes, turnips, and onions.

Once your vegetable garden is finished, plant clover, alfalfa, or legumes as a cover crop. These "green manures" can be plowed under in the spring for a natural fertilizer and soil conditioner.

Houseplants

Bring houseplants indoors before the nights get too cool.

Prepare for Christmas color! Place poinsettias and Christmas cactus indoors where they will receive 10 hours of bright light (and 14 hours of total darkness) each day. A Christmas cactus will need a cool spot (50-60 degrees), while poinsettias are OK at 65-72 degrees.

Plant some spring-flowering bulbs in pots to enjoy over the winter. If you intend to force early blooming for the holidays, put your bulbs in the refrigerator now.

Lawn

The first half of September is prime lawn time! Take advantage of the season to ensure a strong, tough lawn in the future.

Start with core aeration and dethatching, leaving about ½" of thatch to decompose.

If you are planting seed, or if your lawn is thin or weedy, sow seed before mid-month. Let the new shoots grow through 2-3 mowings before applying regular-strength fertilizer or a "weed and feed" product.

Fertilize with a 3-1-2 fertilizer to encourage top growth and winter hardiness.

Cleanup and Maintenance

Now is a great time to clear out new planting beds and apply compost (or leaves and grass clippings) to be ready for spring planting.

Attack those weeds! Commercial herbicides are particularly effective this time of year, as weeds are storing up nutrients in their roots and quickly absorb the herbicide where it counts.

Check out our videos on how to safely target weeds and organic weed control using vinegar.

Label your perennials and bulbs before they die back to the ground.



There's nothing better than autumn: the crispness in the air, the crunch beneath our feet ... and the vibrant fall colors everywhere! The season of pumpkins and apple cider calls forth the nature lover in everyone, drawing us to our favorite spots around Kansas City to see and celebrate this feel-good time of year. While some enjoy the comfort of local parks to gaze at the striking colors of fall, others opt for the excitement of local pumpkin patches and apple orchards. Whatever you prefer, Kansas City is filled with wonderful places to take in the season!

- 1. **Weston, Missouri:** When it comes to fall foliage, Weston promises beauty to all peepers even those just passing through. The drive through Weston in the fall is breathtaking, and there are plenty of places to stop to take it in up close, such as Weston Red Barn Farm. At the farm, you can hop on a hayride to enjoy the views, or simply gaze at the colorful surroundings while frolicking around the pumpkin patch or visiting the farm animals. HELPFUL HINTS ABOUT LIVING IN THE HOMES

BURN PILE AND DUMPSTER. Contact the office before dumping items in the burn pile located at the office. DO NOT PLACE BUILDING MATERIALS IN THE BURN PILE. DO NOT OVERFILL THE DUMPSTER LOCATED IN THE OFFICE PARKING LOT.

SPEEDING. The speed limit in The Homes, Inc. is 20 mph. It only takes a few seconds for a distracted child to dart out in the road. Please be aware and safe while driving.

PARKING: The Homes does not have assigned parking. Please be considerate of your neighbors and their parking needs. Try not to park in a spot that is normally used by your neighbor. If you have guest, have them park in the overflow lots. **NEVER PARK IN YARDS OR COMMON GROUND.**

TOYS & BIKES: Please do not leave toys & bikes in the parks. They create a mowing hazard and a opportunity for thieves. If you have lost a toy or bike in a park, check the office to see if it was picked up.

LITTERING. Think twice about throwing your trash out your car window or into someone's yard. First, it's rude and selfish. Someone will have to pick it up and most of the time it is the maintenance staff. This takes time and money away from other residents needs. Second, it is against the law. Littering is a Class C violation that is punishable by a fine up to a \$500.00. If you are witnessed littering the police will be called and you will be charged, by The Homes, for the time it takes to pick it up and dispose of it.

STICKS AND LIMBS: Place sticks/limbs in 4 foot bundles to the curbside for pickup by maintenance.

TRASH. Do no put your trash to the curb until 4:00 p.m. the day before pickup.

AUTOMOBILE REPAIR. It is against the rules to work on your vehicle in The Homes. If your vehicle needs repair then you will have to go out of the neighborhood or take your vehicle to a mechanic. Unless you are changing a flat tire you should never put your vehicle on a jack in the Homes.

PLUMBING: DO NOT FLUSH FLUSHABLE WIPES. The pipes in our homes are over 70 years old. They do not have the capacity to wash away any other material. Do not flush baby wipes, feminine hygiene products, diapers, paper towels, Q tips, etc. The sink and tub drains are only for water disposal. Do not force items down the drains. If maintenance finds these items consistently causing a back up in your pipes you may be charged for the repair.

KEEP FURNANCE AND WATER HEATER AREAS CLEAN. Having too many clothes, boxes, or general clutter in your utility area can be a fire hazard. Please keep yourself and your neighbors safe and keep your utility areas clean. **DO NOT PILE CLOTHES OR OTHER ITEMS ON TOP OF THE WATER HEATER OR FLU AREA.**

YARDS & PORCHES: Please take the time to clean up/organize your yard and porch. The size of our porches do not allow for you to keep many items on them before they start to look cluttered and messy. If you do not have a shed an affordable idea to store your items in are: deck and patio boxes. They range in cost from \$30 to \$100 and can be purchased on-line or at your local discount store. Items that should not be on your porch: **appliances, boxes, buckets, mops, paint containers or any other "non outdoor" items**. The office offers free paint for the porches.

The Daughters of the American Revolution, DAR, have teamed up with Ronald McDonald house to raise money. DAR collects pop can/soda can pull tabs and donates them to the local Ronald McDonald House, RMH. These tabs are weighed by the RMH and sold to a recycling company for money. The monies collected are then used to defray the costs of families that need to stay at the RMH while they have an ill child in a local hospital. RHM's mission is to reduce the burden of childhood illness on children and their families by providing a "home away from home" while the children are receiving medical care in Kansas City-area hospitals. On any given night, Ronald McDonald House Charities of Kansas City serves 87 families. Last year, our **Houses** and **Family Room** provided lodging to more than 4,500 families as well as opened our doors to support over 63,000 visits from family and friends of in-patients at Children's Mercy Hospital.
